

Thirteen is home to a few tough pin positions (maybe nine) since I have to pick just one, lets go with Pin Position Five, Hole Thirteen Boulder is the infamous "Castle Hole". When you are standing on the tee box of hole #I3B and the pin is placed near the left wall it's a very intimidating shot, you have ask yourself a couple of questions: "Do I have this shot?", "Is it worth the risks?" "Where do I play safe?" "Should I just skip this hole?".

Pin position #7 on hole #16R might be the toughest pin position on the Rock Course and Pin position #5 on hole #13B might be the toughest pin position on the Boulder Course but what's the toughest one of all at Rock Harbor?
